#### Beyond the Atlantic: Finland's Independence Viewed from Across the Sea

While Finland may not have been the first country to go to the moon (or at all, contrary to the picture above), the Nordic country celebrating its 100th Anniversary this year has certainly been the first in many other groundbreaking areas: women were the first in Europe to receive the right to vote AND to be parliamentary candidates; Finland is the first European country to pay its unemployed citizens a monthly, unconditional "citizen pay"; it will be the first in the world to get rid of all school subjects and implement phenomenon-based holistic, interdisciplinary learning by 2020.

To learn more about Finland and its unique history, FASDV has invited author and historian **Marianne Wargelin** to give a centennial lecture, in which she will take a new vibrant look at how Finland arrived at independence and maintained its independence in the 20th century.

She will examine the vision and bravery of its citizens, who were willing to pay a huge price and endure an enormous sacrifice, and how they played a pivotal role in the destiny of Finland. The uniqueness of her lecture is in how she takes a fresh look at the country's historic and contemporary details through the lens of the Finnish diaspora living in the US.

Marianne Wargelin has co-authored *Women Who Dared: The History of Finnish American Women* and published numerous essays and articles on Finnish and Finnish American folklore, popular culture and the arts. She studied at the Universities of Michigan and Minnesota and is currently completing her dissertation at the University of Tampere, Finland. She lives in Minneapolis, MN. She became an Honorary Consul of Finland in 1999 and President of FinnFestUSA in 2004. ~

The tradition continues on Sunday June 11 at 3pm, when FASDV and DVFA (Delaware Valley Finnish-Americans) together honor the Finns and Swedes, who came to the Delaware Valley in 1638 and thus became the first

permanent European settlers in the Tri-State area. They developed friendly relationships with the Lenape and Susquehannock Indians and learned invaluable skills from them that helped them survive and eventually thrive in the new continent.

The ceremony begins at 3pm on Sunday, June 11, followed by a dinner at 4pm at the Embers Restaurant at the Crowne Plaza Hotel, off of I-95 at Naamans Road exit. 


# Valtteri Filppula - #51 with the Flyers

Finns once again have representation in the Philadelphia Flyers! Forward Valtteri Filppula, 33, native of Vantaa, Finland, began playing for Jokerit at age 16 while still in Finland.

Valtteri has won two bronze medals at the World Junior Championship in 2003 and 2004, Olympic bronze medal in 2010 and the Stanley Cup title in 2008 with the Detroit Red Wings. Once he signed a \$25M five-year deal with the Tampa Bay Lightning in 2013, he helped them to the Stanley Cup Playoffs during all of his three seasons there.

They say about Valtteri that "...he is more than capable as a defensive center... and he'll kill penalties effectively and win faceoffs at a decent enough clip..." Go Valtteri!
